P.C.A. is committed to improving and growing its project portfolio for the benefit of Australians from many walks of life.

This past year has seen many significant and exciting developments for The Prince's Charities Australia.

A number of our programs that were in development last year have been implemented in 2016.

In partnership with the National Museum of Australia, we launched the Encounters Indigenous Cultural Workers Scholarship program - a unique program designed to preserve Indigenous cultural heritage through training cultural workers from remote communities. "InterPAR", a pilot trial by our charity partner Phoenix Australia to provide more effective support to those experiencing trauma has commenced in South Australia, and the construction of The Prince's Terraces in Adelaide is now underway.

Another highlight this year was the residential week of our Prince's Lead Your Own Business Program. It is truly wonderful to see the program, now in its second year, change the lives of so many Australian transitioning Defence Force members and their families for the better.

2016 was also a year of internal change. In September, we welcomed new Trustees Cheryl Bart AO, Peter Yu, Holly Ransom and Dominic Richards to our Board. We also farewelled our founding Chairman, Tony Beddison AC, and Trustees Elizabeth Proust AO and Paul Bassat. 

The Prince's Lead Your Own Business program





In its second year of delivery,
The Prince's Lead Your Own Business
program (P.L.Y.O.B.) headlines the
portfolio of His Royal His Royal
Highness' charitable endeavours
in Australia. Developed by P.C.A.,
P.L.Y.O.B. delivers a purposedesigned, nationally accredited
course in business management to
support defence members to start
their own business, and to prepare
them for the world of work when
they transition to civilian life.

Following a competitive application process, participants enrol in Melbourne's RMIT University, and embark on the 18-month program which includes an eight-week online learning course, a week long residential in Melbourne, with ongoing business plan development and mentoring support. Once they have successfully completed the 10 business units of the program, graduates receive a nationally recognised Certificate IV in Small Business Management.

The residential week is a highlight of the program, offering both hands-on training and mentoring from industry experts, while also providing valuable networking opportunities. At the end of the week, 'The Prince's Prize' is awarded to participants who show entrepreneurial flair, are supportive of their fellow cohort, and are highly engaged in classroom sessions.

Four of these Prizes have been awarded since the program began, providing a \$10,000 boost to fund recipients' business aspirations.

Participants in the program are developing a diverse range of businesses, including organisational management, app development, boutique hand crafts, property development and food products to name just a few.

Support for the program is widespread including a personal endorsement from Air Chief Marshal Mark Binskin AC, Chief of the Australian Defence Force. Scholarships for participants have been generously provided by a number of organisations and philanthropists, including P.L.Y.O.B. alumni whose financial contribution in support of other applicants is a great credit to the positive impact of the program.

The program's Principal Sponsor in 2016 was the Pratt Foundation, and corporate partners Defence Housing Australia, EY, and Commonwealth Bank are also providing valuable support.

Encounters Indigenous Cultural Workers Scholarship program

As a legacy of the award winning **Encounters Exhibition developed by** the British Museum and the National Museum of Australia (N.M.A.), The Prince's Charities Australia and the N.M.A. created and jointly funded the Encounters Indigenous **Cultural Workers Scholarship** program to provide participants with the necessary skills to preserve Indigenous and Torres Strait culture for future generations.

His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, Patron of both the British and Australian Exhibitions, provided guidance for the development and structure of the scholarship program.

The Encounters Exhibition was the result of more than five years' work between the N.M.A. and the British Museum, and included extensive consultation with 27 remote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities across Australia. Following the Exhibition, Indigenous communities sought opportunities to develop skills in cultural work, more specifically in developing capacity within their communities to document, preserve Britain, including the Royal Collection. and communicate aspects of their cultural lives.

Launched in September this year, the resulting 12-week scholarship program was designed to facilitate an outstanding program support and development, national and international learning experience for Indigenous and Torres Strait cultural workers from regional and remote communities, and provide opportunities to develop and enhance their cultural, creative and artistic talents.

Through a competitive application process in the first half of 2016, sixscholarship recipients across Australia were selected based on their existing skills, and their dedication and passion for preserving their Indigenous crafts and culture.

The program is tailored for each awardee, based on their designated community cultural development project they are required to lead and deliver within their communities. Between September and November this year, this learning process took recipients to the N.M.A., the British Museum, The Prince's School for Traditional Arts, Cambridge and Oxford Universities and a number of other culturally significant institutions in

The scholarships are valued at \$40k each which covers accommodation, airfares, and a stipend for the participants. In addition, significant in-kind support has been provided by both partnering organisations.

InterPAR with Phoenix Australia

Disaster Resilient: Future Ready

The Prince's Charities Australia, in partnership with Phoenix Australia –Centre for Posttraumatic Mental Health, is developing an evidence-based framework for psychological recovery after trauma and disaster.

Known as the International Program Promoting Adjustment and Resilience (InterPAR), the early-intervention framework addresses a notable gap in current disaster management that is usually reactive rather than proactive.

Importantly, InterPAR (International Program Promoting Adjustment and Resilience) is uniquely designed to be delivered by frontline disaster workers, which will help increase the access and reach of the intervention in communities impacted by trauma and disaster.

With funding support from the Commonwealth Department of Health, the Phase Two trial of the framework has commenced in the bushfire-prone Pinery Fire area of South Australia. InterPAR resource

Completed in November 2015, Phase One of the partnership project convened an international consortium of 21 mental health, trauma and disaster experts at a roundtable in Sydney to discuss methodology and trial processes. His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales attended the official opening of the two-day roundtable and met with the roundtable participants and emergency services personnel.





With funding support from the Commonwealth Department of Health, the Phase Two trial of the framework has commenced in the bushfire-prone Pinery Fire area of South Australia. InterPAR resources have been developed, and include client workbooks, manuals for coaches delivering the program, training and supervision materials. The 12 - month pilot program has been made possible through the collaborative efforts with the Country South Australian Primary Health Network, the Northern Health Network, and the Australian Red Cross.

P.C.A. is currently seeking to secure funding to implement the Phase Three study, which will build upon the findings to date to test the efficacy of the InterPAR intervention through a world first, randomised controlled trial. The findings from this will have a direct and immediate impact on government and organisations involved in recovery after disaster in Australia, with the potential to support communities globally.

We look forward to the completion of the InterPAR framework, which we believe has the potential to lead the way in psychosocial disaster recovery worldwide.

Disaster Resilient: Future Ready is a pilot program that The Prince's Charities Australia and the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (F.R.R.R.) are developing to help communities better withstand the impacts of natural disasters.

This Australian-first project directly responds to a recognised gap in knowledge and understanding of the effective methods required to support resilience and adaptive capacity following natural disasters.

It is critically informed by scientific evidence that the severity and frequency of natural disasters and responses to economic urgency are on the rise, with the total real cost of natural disasters in Australia expected to be around \$33 billion by 2050.

Disaster Resilient: Future Ready is a five-stage, three-year project that will uncover the skills, resources, assets and tools that communities and individuals need to recover from natural disasters, and better prepare for new or changed social, economic and environmental conditions.

From 2017, using action research and co-design methodology, F.R.R. will lead a range of organisations in working with two to three pilot communities in regional Australia to develop and evaluate practical indicators, methods and tools for building improved disaster-preparedness and resilience. To enable a community—led, whole of community approach to change, pilot communities will be supported to participate through the provision of skilled resources to assist with community planning and grants for projects.



By providing a road-tested model of community-led disaster preparedness, we are confident that this project will help governments deal with the impacts of disasters more effectively and economically, and that the model will be adopted and adapted by communities throughout Australia and potentially internationally.

Fewer than half of Indigenous Australian families meet the recommendations for daily fruit intake, and 92 per cent have inadequate daily vegetable intake.

Food insecurity has been shown to affect attendance and academic achievement in children, both in ability upon commencement at school, and in learning throughout the year.

Indigenous Australians experience some of the highest levels of ear disease and hearing loss in the world, with rates up to ten times more than those from non-Indigenous Australians.

Malnutrition and undernourishment are major contributing factors to chronic disease and high mortality rates in Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander communities. Early intervention is vital, and good nutrition is the key to healthy brain development in infants. Sufficient nutrition gives children a better chance at learning, which in turn improves their education, future work and outlook on life.

based not-for-profit organisation, works closely with remote Indigenous schools and communities to implement a holistic educational approach to nutrition.

Thriving Communities was created to combat the poor health conditions and by remote Indigenous communities. The program includes the construction and maintenance of edible gardens, nutrition and cooking classes, and hygiene education.

In 2016, E.O.N. has welcomed five new communities to the program, including Marble Bar, Nullagine, Hedland Senior High School in the Pilbara region, Yiyili and Jarlmadanga Burru in the Kimberley region.

In August, E.O.N. partnered with Western Australia Country Health Service to host an interschool cooking competition between three Pilbara communities. Students from Yandeyarra Remote Community School, Strelley Community School (Warralong Campus) and South Hedland Primary School had an opportunity to showcase produce from their school's 'E.O.N. edible gardens' and demonstrate their cooking skills.

E.O.N.'s team continue to work closely to build positive, long-term relationships with its local communities. Project managers have facilitated more than The E.O.N. Foundation, a West Australian- 500 lessons and workshops with children and their families this past year.

Thriving Communities is now established in 20 remote Aboriginal communities in Western Australia, with many more on the waiting list wishing to join the program.

The Prince's Terrace Adelaide



The Prince's Terrace Adelaide, a ground-breaking residential building project, is a collaboration between Defence Housing Australia (D.H.A.), The Prince's Foundation for Building Community (P.F.B.C.), The Prince's Charities Australia and the State Government's Urban Renewal Authority (Renewal SA).

Located in the regenerated urban precinct of Bowden, The Prince's Terrace Adelaide is being built by local, family-owned Palumbo Construction and will provide 12 high-quality homes.

As the first residential project to receive a 6 Star 'Green Star' design and build rating from the Green Building Council of Australia, the Terrace will showcase how accessible, affordable low-carbon living can be achieved without compromising quality or design.

Having been officially launched by His Royal Highness during his November 2015 Royal Tour of Australia, construction is well underway, with all major in-ground works and ground slabs completed.

Low carbon materials used in this project include locally-made concrete with recycled fly ash, and local granite and recycled bricks from old industrial buildings on the site. All timber used in the project will also be from certified sustainable sources. It is anticipated that each home will use 50 per cent less energy and 50 per cent less potable water than a typical urban dwelling of a similar size.

The project has benefited from the guidance of Dominic Richards, P.C.A. Trustee, and founder of UK based Architekton, visionary architect-developers.

Leveraging his architectural skill and experience as former Vice-Chairman of P.F.B.C, Dominic will visit the site in December 2016 to review the works and materials, and personally update H.R.H. on the progress to date.

With construction scheduled for completion in October 2017, this project will demonstrate how sustainable innovation and world-class architectural design can work in harmony, and set a benchmark for residential development in Australia.

P.C.A. looks forward to 2017 when we will host a number of symposiums 'onsite' with P.F.B.C. and D.H.A. featuring the sustainable measures and techniques of the build with industry professionals and community members.

'The Prince's Terrace Adelaide reinvents the much-loved traditional Australian terrace home with a flexible layout for the great 21st Australian century lifestyle. It also showcases innovative and sustainable design which has led to the project being the first residential scheme in Australia to be awarded a 6- Green Star rating by The Green Building Council of Australia. With the pressure of population growth, re-envisaged Australian Terraces such as these can add attractive density to our cities, fostering walkable communities at a human scale." 

One of the major highlights this year was our visit to London in June. This was a wonderful opportunity to host our Patrons, supporters and corporate partners at events in the presence of His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, and to see several first-hand innovative projects and programs of The Prince's Charities in action.

Throughout the week, we accompanied our Patrons to various community projects initiated by H.R.H., including tours of Poundbury, BRE Innovation Park and The Royal Gardens of Highgrove.

Poundbury is an experimental urban extension of an ancient market town in Dorset. Adhering to architectural principles advocated by The Prince of Wales that promote endurance and timelessness, the town is now home to 2,500 people.

BRE Innovation Park, in Watford, is home to The Prince's Natural House - a low carbon home built from natural materials demonstrating how low cost, sustainable eco living can be achieved.

Highgrove is the private, family residence of Their Royal Highnesses (T.R.H.) The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall in Gloucestershire. Reflecting H.R.H.'s deep commitment to sustainability, the management of the extensive gardens adheres to a variety of sustainability practices.

Our evenings were as busy as our days, and included two remarkable events-H.R.H.'s International Charities Dinners at St James' Palace and Buckingham Palace, along with our Canadian and American colleagues.

The week concluded with a visit to The Prince's Trust and a cultural evening in the West End, made possible by The Arts Centre Melbourne.
